Amerks reverse fortunes in Toronto with six-goal third period *Buffalo News*

A day after giving up the game's last four goals in a 5-3 home loss to AHL-leading Toronto, the Rochester Americans scored six times in the third period and ended a 7-4 win at Ricoh Coliseum against the Marlies Saturday with five unanswered.

The six goals by the Amerks in the final 20 minutes were an AHL season-high for goals in a period.

Kevin Porter scored the game-winner with 2:18 left to help Rochester (27-15-8-6) snap a four-game winless streak. The captain also added two assists.

Stuart Percy and Colin Blackwell each had a goal and an assist. Justin Bailey scored the final two goals of the game, the first on an empty net.

Adam Wilcox made 24 saves in the win. Rochester held a 32-28 advantage in shots on goal.

Former Marlie Seth Griffith opened the scoring 4:47 into the second period. Toronto got on the board soon after and then added two more in the last four minutes to take a 3-1 lead into the final frame.

Rochester's Percy, another former Marlie, scored 5:11 into the third, but Toronto regained its two-goal lead 3:34 later.

With 5:58 left, a long wrist shot from the point by Blackwell found its way through traffic to make it 4-3, and Sean Malone tied it with 3:08 on the clock.

Porter scored the winner less than a minute later, and Bailey added the insurance markers with 1:19 and one second left.

The Amerks return home Wednesday to host the Bridgeport Sound Tigers at 7:05 p.m.

Amerks score six in third to defeat Marlies *Pickin' Splinters*

The Rochester Americans tied an AHL season-high by scoring six times in the third period, including five straight unanswered goals in the final 5:58 of regulation, to come away with a 7-4 win over the league-leading Toronto Marlies to conclude their home-and-home series Saturday afternoon at Ricoh Coliseum.

It was the second time this season the Amerks put up six goals in a single period, matching the same mark they previously set in a 10-3 win over Binghamton back on Nov. 24.

Multi-point nights were had by Justin Bailey (2+0), Colin Blackwell (1+1), Sahir Gill (0+2) and former Marlie Stuart Percy (1+1), while Amerks captain Kevin Porter tallied his second three-point night (2+1) of the season. For the second game in a row against his former squad, former AHL All-Star Seth Griffith opened up scoring on the night, and Adam Wilcox stopped 24 of 28 shots he faced in his first appearance against Toronto this season to improve to 9-4-6.

With the Amerks facing a two-on-one opportunity, Blackwell grabbed the loose puck and sent a cross-ice pass to Griffith, who outwaited Pickard before lifting a shot just under the crossbar to put Rochester ahead 1-0.

The goal came less than five minutes into the second period following a scoreless opening frame.

A few minutes later, the Amerks attempted to clear the puck but it was intercepted by Aaltonen, resulting in a scramble in front of Rochester's net. Rosen unloaded a quick shot from the left point that was redirected in by Smith for his 21st goal of the season.

The Marlies would gain their first lead of the game with just over three minutes remaining in the middle frame when Andreas Johnsson poked the puck backwards to Aaltonen and he flew down the ice for a breakaway to put the hosts up 2-1. The goal was Aaltonen's 15thpoint in the last 10 games.

Amerks demanding more from Sabres prospect Alexander Nylander Olean Times Herald

Chris Taylor prefaced his comments with a reminder Sabres prospect Alexander Nylander is still a teenager, one of the AHL's youngest players, and coming off a lower-body injury that cost him all of training camp and six weeks of the season.

"We always forget how young he is and he went through a major injury this year, too," the Rochester Americans coach said prior to Wednesday's 2-1 loss to the Syracuse Crunch inside KeyBank Center. "He didn't skate, I think, for almost like three months, and it's tough to come back, get your timing and getting everything done. He worked hard this summer."

Right now, like a lot of Amerks, Nylander is struggling. Other than a two-goal, four-point effort in a recent 12-3 walloping of the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Penguins, the Swedish winger has mustered zero goals and three assists in his last 18 outings.

Nylander, the eighth overall pick in 2016, had compiled four goals and 13 points in 32 games this season entering Friday's home tilt against the Toronto Marlies.

So half of his goals and nearly one-third of his points came in one game.

The Sabres sent Nylander, who turns 20 years old on March 2, to Team Sweden for the World Junior Championship Buffalo hosted in December. The tournament, Taylor said, "was good for him."

"Especially when we were winning regularly, he came back in our lineup and added a different spark to it, and then he kind faltered a little bit," said Taylor, whose Amerks had won only two of their last last 15 games entering Friday. "But he's young, he's learning, he's learning how to play hard every night, every shift."

Taylor said Nylander "can't take five seconds off."

"He's learning that," he said. "I'm demanding on him because I know he's got a lot more and I want more from him and I think that'll bring the best out of him, too. We can't lay off him. I think he's the type of guy, he can be a game-changer. That's what we want. We don't want him just to fit in on our team; we want him to be a game-changer on our team.

"That's what I look at for every guy, especially with a guy like that with his talent, he's getting better every day."

The Sabres' old regime, which drafted Nylander, promoted him for four late-season games a year ago. An appearance with the big club seems unlikely this year, however.
