Sabres' Justin Bailey thrilled to be recalled from Amerks

Finally, after a 21-game goal-less stretch in the AHL, Sabres winger Justin Bailey recently started performing like his old self.

Prior to getting summoned Friday, the Williamsville native had four goals and five points in the last five games with the Rochester Americans.

A high ankle sprain he suffered during his last recall helped derail Bailey's promising season. He struggled to recover from one of hockey's trickiest injuries, looking nothing like the youngster who scored 20 goals in each of his first two AHL seasons.

"Those high ankle sprains, they can be fickle," Sabres coach Phil Housley said this morning inside KeyBank Center. "You can tweak them, it's a nagging injury. But he's finally found his stride, and that's why he's going to get an opportunity.

Bailey, who also hurt his hand in December, said ditching bad habits helped him turn a corner late last month.

"When you miss time like that, you forget how to play a little bit," he said. "Just doing the right thing, using my speed, using my size, making sure I was hard on the forecheck and letting my skill do the rest."

This afternoon's tilt against the Vegas Golden Knights will be Bailey's first appearance with the Sabres since Oct. 28.

"It's nice, it's definitely something I wanted to happen at some point before the end of the year," Bailey said of getting recalled.

Bailey, 22, has scored two goals and three points in seven NHL games this season. He has compiled six goals and 10 points in 27 appearances with the Amerks.

In other news, Housley said goalie Robin Lehner will start this afternoon. Defenseman Nathan Beaulieu, a healthy scratch Thursday, will move in for Justin Falk. Defenseman Victor Antipin will also be scratched.

Pickin' Splinters

Over the course of the season, there have been nights that Rochester Americans players left the rink muttering about how they let one get away.

Like three weeks ago, when on back-to-back nights they couldn't beat the team with the worst record in the American Hockey League, the Binghamton Devils.

Actually, it's a fairly lengthy list of should-have-been wins that became overtime or shootout losses.

But on Friday night, following a 2-1 overtime loss to the Providence Bruins, Amerks coach Chris Taylor was fairly content.

With a roster ravaged by recalls and injuries at forward, a point against the team with the third-most wins (36) in the AHL was a solid consolation prize.

"This is one of the good points," said Taylor, whose team has gone to overtime in 25 of 60 games. "They're a really good team, a veteran team with skilled forwards, big D."

The Amerks, meanwhile, used a lineup that included just seven of their top 14 forwards. Justin Bailey on Friday afternoon joined Nick Baptiste, Seth Griffith, Kyle Criscuolo and Danny O'Regan on recall to the parent Buffalo Sabres.

The Amerks still allowed just one goal in regulation, and that came on a twice-deflected Paul Postma shot from the point that last hit the stick of Ryan Fitzgerald at 3:10 of the second period.

On shots not deflected or that came at the net straight, goalie Linus Ullmark wasn't beaten. He finished with 27 saves, including six in the 3 minutes and 13 seconds of overtime.

The winning goal came right off a faceoff to the left of Ullmark. Postma powered his way to the net, had his shot stopped by Ullmark but Fitzgerald was left free to slam home the rebound.

The Amerks were by far the better team in that second period, outshooting the Bruins 12-4 and spending an extended amount of time in the offensive zone. Bruins goalie Jordan Binnington, whose cousin, Ali, played goalie on RIT's women's team from 2012-2015, was also sharp, stopping 23 shots.

The only one that beat him came off the stick of Sahir Gill with just 5:57 remaining in the third period, a slap shot from high in the left circle. It was Gill's 15th goal of the season and was set up by from Eric Cornel, who returned after missing five games because of injury.

While the Amerks were missing half of their forwards, their defense was still solid with Nathan Paetsch, Matt Tennyson, Andrew MacWilliam, Zach Redmond, Stuart Percy and Taylor Fedun. That's one reason the Bruins weren't able to mount sustained O-zone pressure.

"I thought our D played really, really well tonight," said Taylor, whose club fell to 29-15-10-6.

The weekend doesn't get any easier for the Amerks. They play at Syracuse on Saturday night, then return home to play the Crunch at 3:05 p.m. Sunday. The Crunch are second in the AHL North, two points ahead of the Amerks.

RIT's Powell signs tryout contract with Amerks *Pickin' Splinters*

Even though Rochester Institute of Technology was eliminated from the Atlantic Hockey playoffs last weekend, Myles Powell is still getting a chance to skate at Blue Cross Arena at the War Memorial.

Except it won't be in next weekend's AHA tournament. Instead, he has joined the Rochester Americans on an amateur tryout contract and could very well end up in their lineup in the near future.

"It's been pretty crazy," Powell said of the rapid pace at which the deal came together this week between the parent Buffalo Sabres and his agent, Steve Bartlett of Pittsford-based Sports Consulting Group. "I really wasn't expecting it."

Powell and the Tigers were bounced out of the AHA playoffs on Sunday when Sacred Heart won the deciding third game of the best-of-three series 2-0 at the Gene Polisseni Center.

"It's still pretty fresh in my mind, getting knocked out in the first round of the playoffs," Powell said. "You don't want to end your season as a senior in college but you have to move on from that."

The 23-year-old Courtenay, British Columbia, native will quite likely need to endure some good-natured taunting since one of his new teammates is Justin Danforth, who completed a four-year collegiate career at Sacred Heart last spring.

Powell led RIT in assists (26) and finished second in team scoring with 39 points. He was a member of RIT's AHA championship teams as a freshman and sophomore.

The 2014-15 Tigers became the first No. 16 seed in NCAA history to oust the No. 1 seed when they upended Minnesota State-Mankato (and current Sabres defenseman Casey Nelson) in the Midwest Regional semifinals.

Powell was quite sure he'd have the chance to sign with a pro team when his senior season ended, he just didn't know where it would be.

"I'm just happy to get the opportunity here," he said. "It's a big jump but I think I'm ready."

Two of his teammates signed tryout contracts in the ECHL. Defenseman Chase Norrish signed with the Colorado Eagles, reuniting with former RIT teammate Matt Garbowsky, and defenseman Matt Abt joined the Wheeling Nailers.

Ryan Fitzgerald scored both goals as the Providence Bruins defeated the Rochester Americans, 2-1 in night in overtime in the first matchup of the season between the two teams.

Goaltender Jordan Binnington stopped 24 shots in his 14th win of the year for Providence.

The first period was all about defense for Providence, as they limited Rochester to just six shots on net. The P-Bruins controlled offensive play, putting 13 shots on Amerks goalie Linus Ullmark, but was unable to get on the scoreboard.

The top line for Providence broke through at 3:10 of the second period, when Paul Postma kept the puck in the offensive zone and backhanded it into the left wing corner. Austin Czarnik got it there and fed Postma back at the left point. He fired a slap shot toward Ullmark and Fitzgerald deflected it in for his 14th goal of the season.

With six minutes left in the third period Rochester tied it. Sahir Gill took a pass from Eric Cornel and ripped a one-timer over the shoulder of Binnington for his 15th goal of the season.

At 3:13 of the extra period, Fitzgerald and Postma teamed up again for the game-winner. After Fitzgerald won the faceoff to Postma, the defenseman drove to the net and put a backhander on Ullmark. Ullmark stopped his shot, but Fitzgerald came flying in to bury the rebound for his 15th of the season.

The P-Bruins are back in action on Saturday afternoon when they play in Toronto for a matchup against the first- place Marlies at 4 p.m.

Less than a minute later, Muzito-Bagenda tapped in his first of the goal of the season from Danforth and Dalton Smith, but the Rocket tied the game at 2-2 just before the end of the first period.

Amerks lose in overtime to Bruins

A goaltending duel between two American Hockey League All-Star goaltenders in Linus Ullmark of the Rochester Americans (29-15-10-6) and Jordan Binnington of the Providence Bruins (36-19-3-2) lived up to its expectation. The Amerks opened their three-in-three weekend by dropping a 2-1 overtime decision Friday night at The Blue Cross Arena.

Despite the overtime loss, the Amerks, who have earned at least one point in 19 of their last 26 games since Jan. 1, while appearing in a league-high 25 games decided beyond regulation this season.

Amerks forward Sahir Gill scored his 15th goal of the season to force the extra session and now shares the team-lead with Kyle Criscuolo and Kevin Porter. Ullmark made 27 saves for Rochester, which has taken six out of a possible eight points through its first four games of March. The Swedish netminder carries a 19-11-10 record in 41 appearances on the campaign.

Ryan Fitzgerald tallied his fourth multi-point (2+0) effort of the slate for Providence, which has won five of its last six games, while Paul Postma chipped in his second two-assist performance in the last four games. Goaltender Jordan Binnington improved to 14-6-1 as he stopped 23 of 24 on the night.

As regulation was drawing an end, Gill blasted a one-time feed from Eric Cornel to knot the score at 1-1 at the 14:03 mark of the third period.

Cornel dug out a puck from the left corner and centered a pass to Gill atop the near face-off dot. In one motion, Gill fired a shot over the right shoulder of Binnington, spoiling his bid for a shutout and forcing the overtime period.

“I think we didn’t have the start we had liked,” said Cornel. “We had a strong second and third periods, and I think we deserved the point, but we would have preferred two points.”

The Amerks had their best chance of the extra session when they fired a shot that eluded the netminder, but it caromed off the crossbar at the 3:34 mark. Providence responded and ended the contest as Postma sent a backhanded shot on Ullmark before Fitzgerald slipped the rebound into the cage at the with 1:47 left in the frame for his second of the night.

Following a scoreless, penalty-free opening period where Providence held a 13-7 shot-advantage, the Bruins opened the scoring 3:10 into the second stanza. The Amerks outshot the Bruins 12-4 during the frame, but trailed 1-0 going into the second intermission.

“I liked our resilience as a group against a really good team,” said Amerks head coach Chris Taylor. “I thought we stuck with the game plan, had good chances on the power-play, had strong penalty-killing, but unfortunately it was one of those games that just did not go our way.”

Rochester and Providence each fired five shots apiece during the third period, but Gill's tally set-up the overtime session before Fitzgerald sealed the Bruins 2-1 victory.

Syracuse Crunch skate past Rochester 4-2

The Syracuse had a three-goal second period to build towards a 4-2 victory over the Rochester Americans tonight at the War Memorial Arena.

Mathieu Joseph recorded two goals in the win, while Gabriel Dumont and Erik Condra contributed two assists each to advance the Crunch to 36-19-3-3 on the season and 5-1-1-0 in the 10-game season series against the Amerks.

Goaltender Eddie Pasquale made 21 saves in net for the Crunch. Adam Wilcox turned aside 27-of-30 between the pipes for the Amerks. Rochester converted on 2-of-4 power play opportunities and held Syracuse scoreless on their two man-advantages.

Big second period lifts Syracuse Crunch over Rochester Americans **Auburn Citizen**

After a scoreless first period, things started to click for the Syracuse Crunch offense.

The Crunch scored three times in the middle frame — including a pair from players not necessarily known for their scoring prowess — as the Crunch beat the Rochester Americans, 4-2, at the Onondaga County War Memorial Saturday.

“We started connecting,” Crunch forward Daniel Walcott said. “We got a good bounce off (Mathieu Joseph’s) leg and the floodgates opened. We just kept shooting on him. We knew he left a lot of rebounds, we just had to capitalize. We put pucks on net and we got some goals.”

Joseph recorded a pair of goals to lead the Syracuse offense. Defenseman Ben Thomas scored his fourth goal of the season, while Walcott netted his third this season.

The goals came against Adam Wilcox, a former Crunch teammate.

“It was fun because I told him before the game I would score,” Walcott said. “He was kind of mad that I didn’t beat him clean. I beat him off a whiffed shot, but I’ll take them. On the scoresheet they all look the same.”

Crunch captain Erik Condra and Gabriel Dumont each registered a pair of assists, while Dennis Yan, Alexander Volkov and Olivier Archambault each had one helper. Eddie Pasquale finished with 21 saves for the win.

The victory provides the Crunch with some breathing room in the standings. Syracuse came into the game second place in the North Division, just two points ahead of Rochester.

“It’s always important, especially this part of the year knowing they were two points behind us,” Groulx said. “It’s always important.”

The Crunch recorded the first seven shots on goal, and didn’t allow an Americans scoring opportunity for nearly 13 minutes to start the contest. Despite outshooting Rochester 10-5, Syracuse went into the first intermission in a scoreless tie.

“I think we had a bit of a slow start in the first, and then we kind of regrouped in-between periods and said ‘Let’s go here,’” Thomas said. “In the second it kind of came together for us. Pucks were going in.”

Thomas' shot from the point went through a crowd in front and beat Wilcox with eight minute left in the frame, and Walcott added to the Crunch lead less than four minutes later.

"It was a low to high play. It was a good play by (Archambault)," Thomas said of his goal. "It was a slap shot and I think (Wilcox) was screened and it went in."

Kevin Porter's power play goal cut Rochester's deficit to one with 16 minutes remaining, but Joseph sealed the Syracuse victory with an empty-netter in the final minute.

"Overall, I thought we had a strong effort," Groulx said. "Rochester had a push at one moment and got two power play goals. They're a good team, so it was a hard-fought battle. I expect the same game tomorrow."

Syracuse (36-19-3-3) wraps up the three-in-three weekend with a rematch in Rochester Sunday afternoon.

"It's playoff hockey from here on out," Walcott said. "We're going to play all division rivals. It's a close race right now for the playoffs and we've got to come out and play hard because it's going to be a playoff-style game. We've got to take it to the teams we played."

RIT's Myles Powell signs tryout contract with Amerks 13 Wham

Rochester Americans General Manager Randy Sexton announced today that the team has signed forward Myles Powell and defenseman Jake Linhart to Amateur Tryouts (ATO).

Powell, 23, recently concluded a four-year collegiate career at Rochester Institute of Technology (AHA), where he finished with 105 points (45+60) in 149 games with the Tigers. This season, Powell, a two-time AHA Champion, posted career-highs with 26 assists and 39 points while serving as one of four senior captains. He finished second on the team in scoring for the third straight year and was a finalist for the 2018 Hobey Baker Award.

The 5-foot-9, 175 pound-forward became just the 10th player in RIT's Division I history to record 100 or more points. He finished his tenure at R.I.T. tied for second in program history with nine game-winning tallies while ranking sixth all-time with 45 career goals.

After long year, Justin Bailey cashes in his shot with Sabres

This is not the season Justin Bailey expected. It makes days like Saturday a little sweeter.

The right winger has totaled just 35 games because of ankle and thumb injuries. He went 21 games without a goal in Rochester. It added up to just one stint with Buffalo.

Things are finally looking up. Bailey put up four goals and five points in five games with the Amerks. It prompted the Sabres to recall him Friday, and he scored the only goal Saturday in a 2-1 shootout loss to the Vegas Golden Knights.

"Anytime you can help your team against a good team like that it, it's a good feeling," Bailey said in KeyBank Center. "It's been a season of ups and downs this year, so it was definitely good to get one."

Bailey hadn't played for the Sabres since Oct. 28. He had two goals and three points in seven games, but then he suffered an ankle sprain that limited him to just one game with Rochester in a seven-week span. During his return Dec. 15, he hurt his thumb and was out another month.

"It'll be a year that I'm sure that I'll look back on and be able to use later in my career," the 22-year-old said. "I've been fortunate enough not to be injured my first two years pro at all, and it kind of seemed like they all came at once.

"At the same time, it's something I'll learn from. I'm just going to do my best to finish the year strong and I know in Rochester with a playoff push as well."

Before starting his recent hot stretch with Rochester, Bailey had just two goals and three assists in 22 games with the Amerks. That's not what anyone expected from someone who recorded 43 goals and 81 points during his first two seasons in the American Hockey League.

"When you miss time like that, you forget how to play the right way a little bit," Bailey said. "It's just doing the right things, using my speed, using my size and making sure I was hard on the forecheck and letting my skill do the rest.

"It was tough. Obviously, I want to help the team in any way I can, especially being able to score goals. It was definitely a tough stretch when I first came back not exactly feeling 100 percent like myself."

He credits Amerks coach Chris Taylor for getting him back in the right frame of mind.

"He kept positive with me, just telling me to continue to play the right way and things will start to happen," Bailey said. "That's just what happened."

The final month of the season will be important for the second-round pick in the 2013 NHL Draft. His entry-level contract expires this summer, and he'll be a restricted free agent. He has a chance to show he's part of the future with the recall.

"It's definitely something I wanted to happen before the end of the year," said the Williamsville native. "I played physical. I played with speed. Those are two things I can control, my speed and my size. I just tried to come out here and use both of those. "

It was exactly what Sabres coach Phil Housley ordered.

"He's got to use his speed on the forecheck and get to the net," Housley said of the 6-foot-4, 214-pounder. "He's a big kid, so hopefully he'll bring some energy for us.

"He's been using speed. Those high-ankle sprains, they can be fickle. You can tweak them. It's a nagging injury, but he's finally found his stride and that's why he's going to get an opportunity."

Bailey made the most of his best chance, snapping a scoreless tie with 2:47 gone in the third period. Benoit Pouliot knocked away a Vegas pass at the Buffalo blue line, then chased the puck down the ice. He found Bailey in front, and the winger deked Marc-Andre Fleury to the ice and dumped the puck home while tripping over the goaltender.

"It was a great play by Benny there," Bailey said. "He worked hard to go get the puck and made a great pass. I just did my best to finish it.

"I just wanted to have an idea if the pass came to me of what I was going to do."

What he did was score his third goal in eight NHL games this season. That's a pretty good stat line after finally putting up nice numbers with the Amerks.

"What I've been doing in Rochester can translate to here," Bailey said. "Nothing should change between coming back on the backcheck, getting in on the forecheck. Everything I'm doing there should translate here."
